





Reason for Housing Loss

Evicted: Unable to Pay Rent •	20%
Evicted: Other Reason •	19%
Family Conflict •	17%
Addiction or Substance Abuse •—	11%
Job Loss •	7%
Unsafe Housing Conditions •	6%
Personal Choice •	6%
Illness or Medical Condition • — —	4%
Unable to Find Housing•	4%
Domestic Abuse •	4%
Incarceration (Jail or Prison) •	2%

Future of Enumeration

Limitations

- Only one-day snapshot. Does not capture change within a year
- Vulnerable to changes in weather and other events
- Implementation can be resource-intensive
- Community-wide coordinated Homelessness Information **Systems**
 - Real-time data coordinated in shelters (and other service providers)
 - Enumeration becomes a by-product of service delivery
 - However, limited to people who access services
 - **Hybrid enumeration administrative data with street count, magnet events**
