What is the Pathway Accommodation and Support System (PASS)?

The Pathway Accommodation and Support System (PASS) is the new shared client support and bed management system for homeless services and forms part of the priority actions in the National Homeless Strategy, *The Way Home*. PASS has replaced the LINK system as the single shared system in operation across statutory and voluntary homeless services.

What does it do?

PASS will provide the Assessment and Placement function of the new Local Authority Housing Service with a central bed management tool. All Supported Temporary Accommodation (STA) and Temporary Emergency Accommodation (TEA) beds will be allocated through PASS. At all times the Assessment and Placement Function will have live data on temporary bed occupancy across Dublin, thus ensuring access to all available beds on demand.

Statutory and Voluntary partners will utilise PASS as a client support tool which will aid inter agency working. Frontline workers will enter their actions and interventions with service users. PASS is integrated with the Care and Case Management Strategy and will see the Support Plan and the Holistic Needs Assessment Data Return move online replacing the paper based versions. As the Holistic Needs Assessment is a static document, it will remain paper based and only the existence of the HNA will be logged on PASS.

Data Protection

PASS was developed with the assistance of the Office of the Data Protection Commissioner and is fully compliant with the Data Protection Acts 1988 & 2003.

Who sees the information?

Only staff working in core homeless services have access to PASS. Three levels of passwords protect the information on the secure, certified PASS website.

Is my consent required?

Your consent is required to record any information other than your name, date of birth, gender and place of accommodation.

What if I refuse?

It is your right to refuse to provide consent, in which case, no other information other than your name, date of birth, gender and place of accommodation will be recorded on PASS. A Refusal will not exclude you from receiving a service.

How do I provide my consent?

You can provide your consent verbally to a project worker or manager working within homeless services or in writing by completing the attached consent form and giving it to a project worker or manager working within homeless services.

Can I see the information recorded about me?

Yes, under the Data Protection Acts 1988 and 2003, you are entitled to a copy of any information kept on computer about you. You can review on screen or get a print out of the information recorded about you on PASS. You are entitled by law to have any incorrect personal information corrected.

Consent Form

I consent to my information recorded about me and my use of services on PASS.

I understand that this information will be shared with other core homeless service providers in Dublin.

I have been informed of my rights to access all the information recorded about me on PASS.

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Homelessness Data



Official homelessness data is produced by local authorities through the Pathway Accommodation & Support System (PASS). PASS was rolled-out nationally during the course of 2013.

The data produced captures details of individuals in State-funded emergency accommodation, arrangements that are overseen by local authorities. For example data on domestic violence refuges is available through <u>Tusla Child and Family Agency</u>. Data on asylum seekers accommodated in direct provision, is available from the <u>Reception and Integration Agency</u>.

The lead local authorities for homelessness in each region provide monthly reports on homelessness which identify the number of people utilising State-funded emergency accommodation on a regional and county basis.



Rough Sleeping

We carry out rough sleeper counts in April and November of each year. There were 142 persons confirmed sleeping rough on the night of the most recent count in Winter 2016. Please click here for the most recent infograph.

We recognise that a single count only tells part of the picture; rough sleeping is a dynamic situation whereby people can spend long periods sleeping rough or on a sporadic basis. Government policy is a housing led response to homelessness and we are continuing to concentrate our efforts to eliminate rough sleeping through the provision of supported temporary accommodation, an assertive regional contact and outreach approach and the Dublin Housing First Demonstration Project.

Dublin's Housing First Intake Team

The Dublin Housing First Intake Team engage with all individuals that are sleeping rough. This service is operated by Peter McVerry Trust and Focus Ireland. The service will contact those rough sleeping, as often as possible with the specific goal of moving people into accommodation through the Dublin City Council Central Placement Service (CPS) and Assessment and Placement services across the Dublin region. Whilst in accommodation, staff will adopt a case management approach and engage with the person to identify supports that may need to be put in place.

The current Housing First Team has a target of 100 tenacies by 2017. Currently there are 68 individuals in Housing First tenancies. This target has now been revised to up to 300 tenacies under the Rebuilding Ireland Action Plan for Housing and Homelessness. Given that the number of persons who predominantly rough sleep and do not use emergency accommodation is low, Dublin's Housing First Service will be extended to identify persons also accessing emergency accommodation who have high support needs and who are suitable for Housing First supports.



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Homeless Shelter Capacity Report

The annual Shelter Capacity Report provides capacity statistics for emergency homeless shelters, transitional housing and violence against women (VAW) shelters in Canada. The number of shelter facilities and the number of permanent beds are reported for each province and territory, as well as by community.
