#### Numbers we did not have ...

After the death of Mr. Jasinski we received a ton of media attention.

During every interview we faced the same questions: How **many** people do you help? How **many** homeless people are there? How **many** meals do you serve from the truck. How **many** families come?

How *many* women with children do you serve?



We were doing the work... but did not have even one piece of data to prove it.



We were more focused on the mission than on the numbers.

### What We Did!

We started collecting vital data on the individuals we serve, including:

-Names -Date of birth -Country of origin -Next of kin -Brief medical history

**Next,** we looked at the amount of people we were serving weekly.

We began recording daily meals served, weekly pounds of goods rescued, and outreach demographics.

#### Why the Data Mattered to Us

- When we began tracking the Data, **The Mission Grew!**
- We were contacted by local politicians, city agencies, and large non for profits
- We became contractors for the City's Dpt. of Homeless Services
- We operated a fully funded warming center during Winter 18/19



### We're Growing with the Mission

- We've Incorporated and Received Federal Recognition as a 501c3 Tax Exempt Charitable Organization
- We're set to receive \$500,000 in State Funding for a Mobile Shower Program
- We've received a contract from the City of NY in the sum of \$1,000,000 to operate an Emergency Housing Program for the chronically Street Homeless
